A. Call to Order Mayor Raymond called the meeting to order at 5:30pm.

I. Communications

1. Oral

Mayor Raymond opened the meeting.

Evelyn Paquin approached the podium and addressed the Council. She said that there is a house on South Third Street, in the six hundred block, with weeds and piles of dirt. She asked if the owners shouldn't have that taken care of.

City Administrator Wayman explained that there is a multi-step process when a person has code violation, and that Code Enforcement Officer Barnett has quite a few letters out. He requested the specific address of the property she was concerned about.

Ms. Paquin replied that is it either 610 or 609 South Third Street.

Mayor Raymond asked if it was on the left-hand side.

Ms. Paquin responded in the affirmative.

Mayor Raymond stated that they would look into it.

Wayne Worby, 200 Weems Way, approached the podium and addressed the Council. He passed out copies of a letter he had previously sent to the Mayor, saying that the reason he gave it to them is because he had yet to receive any communication back from the Mayor regarding disciplinary action for City Administrator Wayman's behavior during the last Council Meeting. He said that the event was not mentioned in the minutes Council will approve later in the meeting, adding that he was unsure why there was no mention of it. He encouraged Council to look into the matter and not sweep it under the rug.

Barb Petrea, 604 Lancaster Road, approached the podium and addressed the Council. She expressed her thanks to the City staff and citizens of Selah for the homecoming week they had last week, adding that she knows it was frustrating for the Police Department to close traffic. She felt that, if they do this every year at the same time and place, people will get used to it, and requested any suggestions they might have to better inform the public. She reiterated her thanks for their time and energy.

Mayor Raymond told Ms. Petrea that she did a great job with the parade.

Carl Torkelson approached the podium and addressed the Council. He passed out copies of a letter to Council, saying that it was a paper copy of what he was going to read. He thanked the Mayor and Council, City Administrator Wayman, and the City staff for the stellar work they always do, listing off several of the many projects and initiatives that have been done. He felt that they had a lot of negativity given to them, and he wanted to stand up and express his thanks for their hard work. He said that he wanted to address a situation and make it more vocal and direct for the citizens to see on record, and then read aloud from the letter he passed out. He stated that he is repulsed by this, feeling that it is a waste of money that could go to many different places, and he hoped that this would help the public recognize they have a serious matter on their hands. He hoped that bringing it up so publicly might inspire Mr. Worby to cease his numerous record requests.

Council Member Tierney moved, and Council Member Ritchie seconded, to place the letters from Mr. Worby and Mr. Torkelson on the record as part of the official Minutes. By voice vote, approval was unanimous.

Seeing no one else rise to speak, Mayor Raymond closed the meeting.

Council Member Tierney moved, and Council Member Sample seconded, to approve the Consent Agenda as read. By voice vote, approval of the Consent Agenda was unanimous.

L. Public Hearings

1. Public Hearing on Revenue Sources for the 2017 Budget

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski addressed L – 1. He talked about proposed increase in taxes, saying that they have the authority to increase property taxes by one percent, which would mean an additional fifteen thousand dollars in revenue for the next calendar year. He noted that they are allowed to tax new construction, which has never been taxed before, and will be receiving information from the County Assessor on what that new figure is. He said that the current levy rate per thousand will increase very little based on the new rates.

City Administrator Wayman asked that he give the total figure per thousand.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski replied that he believes it was approximately twelve dollars and thirty cents, of which roughly half is for school taxes, a portion for County general operations, and some for the smaller districts as well.

Council Member Tierney commented that unrestricted property taxes are at two dollars and fifty-six cents, with restricted taxes twenty-five cents per thousand for EMS.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski responded that EMS is done at the County level, and he believes the maximum is twenty-five cents.

Council Member Tierney remarked that the true actual amount would be two dollars and eighty-one cents per thousand.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski reviewed the utility fund increases, which he noted were based on a long-term forecast as to the operating costs and improvements of both water and sewer systems, saying that they will be requesting a four percent increase in water and two percent in sewer. He went on to say that they are also requesting a four percent increase in the garbage fund, as it has been three years since there has been a rate increase, although Basin Disposal has been charging a small COLA increase each year. He stated that this is to help assist in operating costs, adding that a re-evaluation of labor costs and the share allocated to the Solid Waste Fund is up slightly. He gave examples of how this will affect the average customer as well as those who are low-income seniors or disabled.

Council Member Tierney asked about one of the formulas on the rate increase.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski replied that it was a formula error, and the correct amount is a dollar and seventy-two cents.

Council Member Tierney observed that they only have forty residents covered by low-income senior or disabled, and suggested not passing on a rate increase to them next year.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski suggested that, when Council meets in October for their budget meetings, that they discuss the matter at that time.

Council Member Underwood wondered what age is considered senior.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski responded that it is sixty-five, with an income of fifteen thousand or lower, but noted that the only count two-thirds of the retirement and Social Security income, so an individual could actually receive twenty-two thousand and still qualify. He requested that the Mayor open the public hearing.

Council Member Carlson inquired as to whether landlords or tenants paid for garbage service on duplexes.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski replied that it can vary, but in most cases he believes that the landlords would rather the tenants pay the utilities.

Council Member Carlson asked why they are differentiating between single family residences versus duplexes.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski explained that the base charge for service is on both units, saying that there may be discussion on re-evaluating properties with two units versus four or more.

Council Member Carlson commented that they should to do their best to tax long-term citizens less, and try to encourage home ownership.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski noted that people who rent are paying taxes as well.

Mayor Raymond opened the Public Hearing. Seeing no one rise to speak, she then closed the Hearing.

M. General Business

1. New Business

- a. Approval to file a Grant Application with the Department of Ecology for the Taylor Ditch Outfall Reduction project

Public Works Director Henne addressed M – 1a. He said that they did a pollution monitoring report a couple years back to determine some of pollutants getting into Taylor Ditch and where they were coming from, and as a result of that sent an application to the Department of Ecology last October for a loan with a twenty-five percent match that would eliminate two sources. He stated that the first source is stormwater runoff on north Wenas Road, north of the bank, and other is from the High School parking lot. He said that the original application was not funded. He requested approval to submit an application to DWSRF for 2017 funds with 2018 construction, saying that after talking with the Selah School District they provided a letter of support for the project. He reviewed the estimated costs provided in the packet.

Council Member Overby asked if it had ever been permissible for people to dump stormwater into Taylor Ditch.

Public Works Director Henne replied that it wasn't a concern in the past, outlining where the line runs through town and adding that the parking lot for Red Apple also connects their storm sewer system to it.

Council Member Tierney wondered why the County isn't responsible for the funds from an illicit connection, as the City didn't do it.

Public Works Director Henne responded that when they annex something it becomes theirs.

Council Member Overby inquired if it was the same situation with the School District property.

Public Works Director Henne replied that they connected around 1989.

Council Member Tierney observed that the School District is stepping up but the County is not.

Public Works Director Henne responded that State law says cities under a population of twenty thousand have rules regarding a State highway in town. They are responsible for matters such as stormwater, plowing, lights, and sidewalks.

Council Member Overby asked why they are paying for someone else's illicit connection.

Public Works Director Henne replied that, if they don't make an application, they might want us to pay for the entire amount out of pocket.

Council Member Tierney remarked that the County made the illegal connection then the State took it over as a highway, and wondered if either entity knew they had an illicit connection.

Public Works Director Henne responded that those connections were permitted back then, but a lot has changed and now it is no longer permitted.

Council Member Overby moved, and Council Member Tierney seconded, to Approve Filing a Grant Application with the Department of Ecology for the Taylor Ditch Outfall Reduction project. Roll was called: Council Member Overby – yes; Council Member Tierney – yes; Council Member Sample – yes; Council Member Ritchie – yes; Council Member Bell – yes; Council Member Underwood – yes; Council Member Carlson – yes. By voice vote, approval was unanimous.

2. Old Business **None**

N. Resolutions

1. Resolution to authorize the Mayor to sign a contract with the Washington State Public Works Board for a Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Loan, Contract No. DM16-952-130

Public Works Director Henne addressed N – 1. He said that this authorizes them to move ahead with engineering and design, as the SEPA has already been completed. He remarked that the State sent the contract to have Council approve and the Mayor sign then pulled it to rework, and gave it back two weeks ago saying it was good to go. He noted that the contract is for the Well No. 7 and Palm Park Booster Station improvements, for a twenty-year loan at one point five percent interest, and is part of the projects identified in the water system plan.

Council Member Tierney wondered what changed from the original contract.

Public Works Director Henne replied that nothing did. All he received was a letter saying to use the contract.

Council Member Carlson asked him to confirm that nothing changed.

Public Works Director Henne reiterated that nothing had changed.

Council Member Tierney inquired about the revenue source for paying the loan.

Public Works Director Henne responded that it is part of the water rates.

Council Member Tierney moved, and Council Member Overby seconded, to approve the Resolution to authorize the Mayor to sign a contract with the Washington State Public Works

Board for a Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Loan, Contract No. DM16-952-130. Roll was called: Council Member Overby – yes; Council Member Tierney – yes; Council Member Sample – yes; Council Member Ritchie – yes; Council Member Bell – yes; Council Member Underwood – yes; Council Member Carlson – yes. By voice vote, approval was unanimous.

2. Resolution authorizing the Mayor to sign and submit a Yakima County SIED Fund Application for the First Street Subarea Planning Study

City Planner Bedi addressed N – 2. He said that the Resolution authorizes the Mayor to sign and submit a SIED fund application for sixty thousand dollars, with a twenty percent fund match from the City.

Council Member Ritchie inquired as to when will the application will be approved or denied.

City Planner Bedi replied that the submission deadline is October 6, and they will meet at the end of October to vote. He hopes to hope to hear from them by early November.

Council Member Ritchie asked about the timing of the process if they receive a yes on the application.

City Planner Bedi responded that the funds would be available right away, and they could start the process immediately.

Council Member Ritchie observed that the plan is wider than First Street, also including some of Jim Clements Way.

City Planner Bedi replied that area is wider, and referred Council to the map in their packets.

City Administrator Wayman indicated the area on the City map hanging behind him.

Council Member Ritchie noticed that it would not cover the Marudo properties.

City Administrator Wayman responded that they would not be involved; they are commercial properties.

Council Member Ritchie wondered why not.

City Administrator Wayman replied that a subarea plan is for redevelopment and renewal, not undeveloped or newly developed properties.

Council Member Ritchie moved, and Council Member Carlson seconded, to approve the Resolution authorizing the Mayor to sign and submit a Yakima County SIED Fund Application for the First Street Subarea Planning Study. Roll was called: Council Member Overby – yes; Council Member Tierney – yes; Council Member Sample – yes; Council Member Ritchie – yes; Council Member Bell – yes; Council Member Underwood – yes; Council Member Carlson – yes. By voice vote, approval was unanimous.

1. Fire Prevention Week Proclamation

Mayor Raymond read aloud the Proclamation proclaiming the week of October 9 – 15, 2016 as Fire Prevention Week.

Council Member Underwood asked if the Fire Department could purchase bulk fire alarms at a discount rate.

Fire Chief Hanna replied in the negative, but added that they do have a supply on hand. He said that their motto is to leave no house unprotected, and if a home doesn't have a working one than they will supply one.

Council Member Underwood suggested checking homes and providing them to the senior community.

Fire Chief Hanna responded that they are glad to check and install, but noted that it is a landlord's responsibility to provide them for rental properties.

Q. Reports/Announcements

1. Departments

Police Chief Hayes had no report.

Recreation Manager Mullen spoke briefly about the Civic Center, listing three upcoming events and that the women's bathroom ceiling fan broke and was repaired. He thanked the staff and all who provided support for the Base Race and Fall Festival, as well as King's Row and Bill Harris for their sponsorship, saying that he hopes to have final numbers on the event for the next Council Meeting. He briefly discussed the feedback received and changes he will be implementing for future events, both for the Fourth of July event and the Fall Festival, noting that there are plenty of opportunities for businesses and individuals to get involved.

Council Member Tierney asked who won.

City Administrator Wayman replied that the winner was a young medical student from Yakima.

Recreation Manager Mullen added that he thought the winner's name was Colby Dixon, and that he said he would be back next year to defend his title.

Council Member Carlson wondered who it was who said they could help double the numbers.

Recreation Manager Mullen responded that it was the Sage Rat Run race directors, and he will be meeting with them next week to discuss the matter.

Council Member Underwood thought they should look at having the race on a weekend when there are no conflicts with other races.

Recreation Manager Mullen replied that the Yakima Sports Commission has a master calendar of events, and that their weekend in September is their niche. He added that they would revisit their marketing strategy to create a bigger niche, noting that forty percent of runners came from a minimum of one and a half hours away.

City Administrator Wayman noted that the track was certified.

Recreation Manager Mullen affirmed his statement, saying that it was done by United States Track and Field.

City Administrator Wayman said that they also had an excellent timing system and cash prizes for the winners of each race, which helped to make it a success. He hoped that 2017 would be even bigger. He remarked that the race is very important to the Japanese military, as they pick their best runners to come and train each year.

Recreation Manager Mullen remarked that it was also the perfect time because it leads them to their home visits. Some host families came to the park to pick up runners to take to their homes.

Council Member Bell commented that he talked to the vendors, and all spoke highly of it being the first year. He thanked Recreation Manager Mullen for all the hard work he put into making that a success.

Recreation Manager Mullen thanked him for his help with vendors that day, saying that it was a passion project. He noted that one change for the future would be having the entertainment start when the runners are coming in.

Council Member Tierney asked if any Marines ran the course.

Recreation Manager Mullen responded that they had about thirty Marines and an Air Force guy.

Council Member Tierney felt that it would be good to have each branch come and compete.

Council Member Carlson inquired about the skate park.

Recreation Manager Mullen replied that the grant was approved and they are currently working on fundraisers for the next calendar year, to raise additional funds. He promised a more detailed report at the next Council meeting.

Council Member Bell was excused for a personal commitment.

Fire Chief Hanna thanked the Mayor for signing the proclamation, saying that it is a serious thing for them to have smoke detectors in residences, and they want to spread the word to remind people how important they are. He went on to say that the hydrant testing was complete, thanking Public Works for

following up on any repairs to be made, and that the department would be working shifts tomorrow at the fair, both to spread the Fire Commission message and to utilize it as a point of contact for volunteers.

Clerk/Treasurer Novobielski gave a brief update on sales tax revenues, referring Council to a handout in front of them showing comparisons between this year and the last. He expressed optimism that this trend will continue, with new businesses continuing to open in Selah.

Public Works Director Henne said that he is working on budget information as well as working with the insurance carrier to get updated information regarding equipment, buildings, and other items. He went on to say that the pool has been repaired and filled, and is ready for winter, the new generator for the wastewater treatment plant should arrive on the second, and that they are busy doing hydrant repairs.

City Planner Bedi stated that there would be no Planning Commission meeting next week.

Human Resources Manager Potter gave a brief review of the hiring situation regarding a public records assistant, saying that they chose to evaluate internal candidates and will be moving a person from Public Works to City Hall. He added that her scheduled start date is next Monday, October third. He went on to say that there will now be a general Public Works assistant who reports to Public Works Director Henne, as well as one for the new Community Development and Planning Department, who will report to City Planner Bedi. He noted that they would be conducting interviews for the position next week.

Council Member Tierney inquired which position they would be filling.

Human Resources Manager Potter responded that it would be the one for the newly formed department, adding that the assistant will be dealing with planning, permits, the Planning Commission, staffing the front desk, handling cash transactions, and fielding general inquiries.

City Attorney Noe had no report.

2. Council Members

Council Member Ritchie had no report.

Council Member Overby expressed his appreciation for the Fall Festival, saying that it has promise for the future, and he looks forward to attending next year.

Council Member Sample had no report.

Council Member Tierney had no report, but said he would like to know if the Selah Downtown Association (SDA) does anything regarding recognizing updates to current businesses or remodels, as he would like to see recognition when they make improvements. He remarked that there are some nice looking facilities being put out, such as the new McDonald's and that he would like to see them acknowledged.

Barb Petrea, president of the Selah Downtown Association, approached the podium and addressed the Council. She said that they gave out ten awards at gala two weeks ago, recognizing a variety of businesses and individuals, including the Mayor, and that they plan to do so every year.

Council Member Underwood gave a brief report on the last Selah School District (SSD) board meeting, which focused on Viking Pride and the Pride patrol.

Council Member Carlson observed that he has seen the SSD step up and wanted to give credit to them, as he appreciates their efforts with the children, with Viking Pride, and helping with the Taylor ditch project. He also expressed thanks to Recreation Manager Mullen, Civic Center Manager Tait, and Mr. Rocha for the Base Race and Autumn Festival, and recognized Human Resources Manager for his knowledge and understanding for the position he holds.

3. City Administrator

City Administrator Wayman reminded the Council that there will be Study Sessions for the next three Council meetings, a three pm session with Buxton on October 11th, ad four-thirty pm session on the First Street Beautification project on October 25th, and a two-thirty pm session on November 8th with Traho Architects, and that these sessions will be important for the decisions they will be making later. He said that Jamie Morford has been working with Clear Risk on accounting for every item to be insured, and they should have the update finished today. He thanked the Department Heads for their hard work and diligence on the budget, adding that he and the Mayor have had budget conferences with each one. He stated that he is determined to present the finance committee with a balanced budget going into next year. He also talked about the new Community Development and Planning department that will be created as of October third, which will split off from Public Works and allow for a more natural city management design, with plans, permitting, code enforcement, and building reporting to City Planner Bedi. He thanked Public Works Director Henne for making sure the handover is done as smoothly as possible.

Council Member Tierney asked if they would have a full Council for the budget meetings.

Council Member Overby observed that whomever could show up would attend.

City Administrator Wayman stated that he would like as many as possible to attend.

Mayor Raymond said that she came into this about a year ago by sitting in on the budget meetings for 2016, and that she has a whole new appreciation of what they do now that she is sitting on the other side now.

Council took a five-minute recess.



Council Member Tierney moved, and Council Member Carlson seconded, that the meeting be adjourned. By voice vote, approval was unanimous.



On September 13, 2016 I attended a Selah City Council meeting in Selah city hall. During the open comment period I presented my concerns about an email that had been sent by Selah City Administrator, Don Wayman, to an anonymous Selah citizen that had requested public information from the city. I had taken time to copy comments from the hearing minutes of the city council meeting regarding Facebook comments made by Bill Callahan concerning issues in Selah and officials of the city. I read the comments to the council that had condemned and criticized Bill for being among other things; rude, inappropriate, spiteful, lies and beneath the expectations of someone serving on an official city committee. I then read the email Mr. Wayman had sent and stated that the comments Mr. Callahan made on Facebook paled in comparison to the inappropriateness of Mr. Wayman's email. I subsequently presented each council member and yourself a letter that explained why I oppose any changes to Mr. Wayman's contract regarding the severance pay.

I then returned to my seat in the audience and observed the start of the next item on the agenda. At that time I looked at Mr. Wayman and he was watching me...when he saw I was looking, he blew me a kiss. This behavior is incredibly contemptable, rude and disgusting. As the top city administrator I expect him to be professional and respectful at all times, this is yet another example of his inability to control his behavior.

I am asking that you conduct a full investigation of Mr. Wayman, his history of bullying, sexual harassment and lack of anger management. Please research into all of his previous employment for any history of issues and settlements.

As mayor and being accountable for Mr. Wayman's employment, I expect there will be personal and appropriate discipline applied as a result of your investigation. I will also expect you to report your findings to the city council and ask them to vote on your recommended discipline during the open meeting.

I would first, like to thank Mayor Raymond, the Council, Mr. Wayman and the City Staff for all of the stellar work you have been doing on behalf of the residents of Selah. I can list many projects and initiatives such as the proposed Sub-Area Plan, retail recruitment, increased and more effective code enforcement, the Base Race and Autumn Festival, I could go on and on.
