These standards are subject to revision and will be updated whenever necessary in order to comply with constitutional requirements.

Background/Findings/Facts: At the City Council meeting on October 10, 2023, the owner of a business property situated just outside of the City's currently-existing Downtown Parking Exempt Area petitioned to enlarge the Downtown Parking Exempt Area so as to include parcels fronting the south side of Each Naches Avenue between South First Street and Jim Clements Way. The City Council expressed a general willingness to likely expand the area as requested.

Thereafter, City staff drafted proposed amendments to SMC Chapter 10.34 that, if later enacted, would effectuate the enlargement, and, on a related issue, also would specify where electric vehicle charging stations can be installed. Those proposed amendments were considered by the City's Planning Commission during a study session on October 24, 2023, and also during a public hearing on November 21, 2023. Ultimately, the Planning Commission recommended that the proposed amendments be enacted.

In anticipation of today's City Council meeting, City staff revised its prior draft. However, the revised draft makes only formatting, numbering, organization and language changes from the prior draft; the operative effect – specifically, how and where the Downtown Parking Exempt Area would be enlarged, and how and where electric vehicle charging stations can be installed – has not been changed from the prior draft.

All of the proposed amendments are shown in editing marks on the separately-submitted proposed Ordinance, which proposed Ordinance the City Council should consider following conclusion of the instant open-record public hearing.

SELAH PLANNING COMMISSION

RECOMMENDATION TO THE SELAH CITY COUNCIL FOR AMENDEMNTS TO SELAH MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 10.34 PARKING REGULATIONS

WHEREAS

The City of Selah, hereafter referred to as the "City" pursuant to RCW 36.70A.040 is required to plan under the provisions of the Growth Management Act; and

WHEREAS

Pursuant to RCW 36.70A.130(1) the City is required to take legislative action to review and revise its development regulations in accordance with the Growth Management Act; and,

WHEREAS

Pursuant to RCW 36.70A.020, goals are set forth to guide the development and adoption of comprehensive plans and adoption of development regulations; and

WHEREAS

Selah Municipal Code Title 10 contains zoning and subdivision regulations that govern the City's administrative procedures for development actions; and,

WHEREAS

The City of Selah last amended its parking regulations in 2004; and,

WHEREAS

The City of Selah Planning Commission conducted one study session on the draft parking and charging station amendments on October 24, 2023; and,

WHEREAS

Environmental Review was conducted under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). A Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was issued on November 10, 2023.

WHEREAS

Public notice of the public hearing was published in the official newspaper of the City and sent to all parties who expressed interest in the development regulations through the public review and SEPA processes on October 27, 2023; and,

WHEREAS

At its November 21, 2023, public hearing, the Selah Planning Commission heard the staff presentation regarding the proposed development regulation amendments, took public testimony, and recommended approval of the proposed amendments; and,



Now therefore, the Selah Planning Commission presents the following findings and recommendations to the Selah City Council:

Based upon a review of the information contained in the staff report, exhibits, testimony and other evidence presented at an open record public hearing held on November 21, 2023, the Planning Commission makes the following:

PURPOSE AND DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS:

At the October 10, 2023, Council meeting, a business owner with property located just outside of the City's Parking Exempt Area petitioned the City Council to expand the parking exempt area to the area depicted upon the attached maps which the council affirmed. The business owners' reason for the request is to remove the requirement for businesses, and existing and future buildings in the affected area to have to provide off-street parking, thus increasing the redevelopment potential for properties on the south side of E. Naches Ave.

The second amendment is the allowance of Electric Vehicle Charging Stations in all commercial and industrial zoning districts, and public and private parking lots. The state of Washington requires that all cities in the state not prohibit vehicle charging stations and allow them wherever gas stations are allowed within the city. The City of Selah does not prohibit or disallow vehicle charging stations, however they are not specifically permitted in the city code either. Therefore, this amendment will permit and codify where EV Charging Stations are allowed throughout the city based upon zoning district.

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. The City of Selah Planning Commission conducted one study session on the draft parking and EV Charging Station amendments on October 24, 2023; and,
- 2. Environmental Review was conducted under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). A Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was issued on November 10, 2023.
- 3. Public notice of the public hearing was published in the official newspaper a minimum of 10-days prior to the Planning Commission's public hearing on October 27, 2023.
- 4. On October 31, 2023, the City of Selah Planning Department received one public comment letter in support of the draft parking amendments.
- 5. During the public hearing _____ members of the public spoke on the proposed amendments when the Planning Commission Chair opened the hearing for public comment.
- 6. The Planning Commission considered the proposed development regulation amendments and public comments at the public hearing on November 21, 2023.

- 7. The Planning Commission found that the expansion of the parking exempt area will increase the redevelopment potential for properties on the south side of E. Naches Ave., and should not negatively impact surrounding businesses.
- 8. The Planning Commission also found that the allowance of Electric Vehicle Charging Stations in all commercial and industrial zoning districts, and public and private parking lots will permit and codify where EV Charging Stations are allowed throughout the city based upon zoning district, and bring the city's codes more into conformance with state law.

CONCLUSIONS

- 1. The proposed development regulation revisions, of SMC Title 10.34 Off-Street Parking and Loading, meets the requirements of the Growth Management Act.
- 2. The proposed parking and EV Charging Stations amendments are consistent with and implement the Comprehensive Plan, and are consistent with the Growth Management Act and other requirements of state law.
- 3. The public hearing was duly advertised in accordance with state and local law.
- 4. All members of the public were given an opportunity to comment in writing, and verbally during the open record public hearing.
- 5. The public use and interest will be served by adopting the proposed amendments.

MOTION

Based on the testimony and evidence presented during the public hearing, I move that the Planning Commission adopt the findings of fact and order that the draft ordinance dated November 21, 2023 be forwarded to the Selah City Council with a recommendation of approval of the proposed amendments to Chapter 10.34 Off-Street Parking and Loading of the Selah Municipal Code.

PROPOSAL: Selah Planning Commission consideration and public hearing for amendments to Selah Municipal Code (SMC) Title 10.34 Off-Street Parking and Loading pertaining to the expansion of the City of Selah's Parking Exempt Area, and providing for the allowance of Electronic Vehicle (EV) Charging Stations in all zoning districts where gas stations are allowed, as well as within public and private parking lots, and Environmental Review of the amendments in their entirety.

<u>STAFF RECOMMENDATION:</u> The Selah Community Development and Planning Division recommends that the Planning Commission hold the required public hearing, take public input, revise the draft amendments as necessary and forward the Planning Commission's recommendation to the Selah City Council for final consideration.

PURPOSE AND DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS: At the October 10, 2023, Council meeting, a business owner with property located just outside of the City's Parking Exempt Area petitioned the City Council to expand the parking exempt area to the area depicted upon the attached maps which the council affirmed. The business owners' reason for the request is to remove the requirement for businesses, and existing and future buildings in the affected area to have to provide off-street parking, thus increasing the redevelopment potential for properties on the south side of E. Naches Ave. Note: Expansion of the Parking Exempt Area does not affect any businesses or property owners right to provide private off-street parking stalls for their patrons or the right to limit or prohibit the use of said private parking stalls/lots.

The second amendment is the allowance of Electric Vehicle Charging Stations in all commercial and industrial zoning districts, and public and private parking lots. The state of Washington requires that all cities in the state not prohibit vehicle charging stations and allow them wherever gas stations are allowed within the city. The City of Selah does not prohibit or disallow vehicle charging stations, however they are not specifically permitted in the city code either. Therefore, this amendment will permit and codify where EV Charging Stations are allowed throughout the city based upon zoning district.

AFFECTED AREA FOR PARKING EXEMPT AREA EXPANSION: The geographic area starting from the north side of East Naches Ave., south to the south side of the city alley/parking lot (N. of E. 1st Ave.), and bounded by S. 1st St. on the west and S. Wenas Ave. on the east (see attached maps for existing and proposed parking areas).

MUNICIPAL CODES AMENDED:

A portion of the central business core city's downtown Business, General (B-2) zoning district the shaded area depicted in Figure 34-1, is exempt from the provisions of this chapter relative to the number of off-street parking spaces required. All other requirements of this chapter shall apply to any off-street parking provided by a property owner or business.



10.34.125 Electric Vehicle Charging Stations.

A. Electric vehicle charging stations, as defined by RCW 36.70A.695(5), or as amended, shall be allowed as follows, except for on resource lands or in critical areas:

1. As an accessory use to an approved principal use in the B-1, B-2, and, M-1, zoning districts.

2. As a right-of-way use permit in public parking lots and/or on-street public parking areas.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW (SEPA): Environmental Review was conducted under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). A Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was issued on November 10, 2023.

<u>PUBLIC NOTICE:</u> Notice of Public Hearing and legal publication occurred in the Yakima Herald Republic on October 29, 2023, and was posted on the city's website greater than ten days prior to the Planning Commission hearing.

<u>PUBLIC & AGENCY COMMENTS:</u> As of the date of this report, one public comment was received on the proposed amendments.

CONCLUSIONS:

- 1. Pursuant to RCW 36.70A.040 the city is required to plan under the provisions of the Growth Management Act; and
- Pursuant to RCW 36.70A.130(1) the City is required to take legislative action to review and revise its development regulations in accordance with the Growth Management Act; and,
- 3. Pursuant to RCW 36.70A.020, goals are set forth to guide the development and adoption of comprehensive plans and adoption of development regulations; and
- 4. Selah Municipal Code Title 10 contains zoning and subdivision regulations that govern the City's administrative procedures for development actions; and,
- 5. The City of Selah adopted its current Parking Exempt area in 2004 with no revision following adoption; and,
- 6. The public use and interest will be served.
- Environmental Review for the proposed amendments was conducted under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). A Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was issued on November 10, 2023. Additionally, no appeals were filed during the 5-day appeal period following issuance.
- 8. Public notice of the public hearing was published in the official newspaper a minimum of 10-days prior to the Planning Commission's public hearing.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends **APPROVAL** and **ADOPTION** of the draft parking/charging amendments.

All other requirements of this chapter shall apply to any off-street parking provided by a property owner or business.



10.34.125 Electric Vehicle Charging Stations.

A. Electric vehicle charging stations, as defined by RCW 36.70A.695(5), or as amended, shall be allowed as follows, except for on resource lands or in critical areas:

- 1. As an accessory use to an approved principal use in the B-1, B-2, and, M-1, zoning districts.
- 2. As a right-of-way use permit in public parking lots and/or on-street public parking areas.

Special Terms and Conditions

1. **AUTHORITY**

COMMERCE and Contractor enter into this Contract pursuant to the authority granted by Chapter 39.34 RCW.

2. CONTRACT MANAGEMENT

The Representative for each of the parties shall be responsible for and shall be the contact person for all communications and billings regarding the performance of this Contract.

The Representative for COMMERCE and their contact information are identified on the Face Sheet of this Contract.

The Representative for the Contractor and their contact information are identified on the Face Sheet of this Contract.

3. COMPENSATION

COMMERCE shall pay an amount not to exceed \$50000 (fifty thousand dollars), for the performance of all things necessary for or incidental to the performance of work under this Contract as set forth in the Scope of Work.

4. BILLING PROCEDURES AND PAYMENT

COMMERCE will pay Contractor upon acceptance of deliverables provided and receipt of properly completed invoices, which shall be submitted to the Representative for COMMERCE not more often than monthly nor less than quarterly.

The invoices shall describe and document, to COMMERCE's satisfaction, a description of the work performed, the progress of the project, and fees. The invoice shall include the Contract Number 24-63326-138.

Payment shall be considered timely if made by COMMERCE within thirty (30) calendar days after receipt of properly completed invoices. Payment shall be sent to the address designated by the Contractor.

COMMERCE may, in its sole discretion, terminate the Contract or withhold payments claimed by the Contractor for services rendered if the Contractor fails to satisfactorily comply with any term or condition of this Contract.

No payments in advance or in anticipation of services or supplies to be provided under this Agreement shall be made by COMMERCE.

Invoices and End of Fiscal Year

Invoices are due on the 20th of the month following the provision of services.

Final invoices for a state fiscal year may be due sooner than the 20th and Commerce will provide notification of the end of fiscal year due date.

The Contractor must invoice for all expenses from the beginning of the contract through June 30, regardless of the contract start and end date.

<u>Duplication of Billed Costs</u>

The Contractor shall not bill COMMERCE for services performed under this Agreement, and COMMERCE shall not pay the Contractor, if the Contractor is entitled to payment or has been or will be paid by any other source, including grants, for that service. Any payment made by COMMERCE for costs that are determined to be duplicate, in Commerce's sole determination, shall be subject to recapture and may result in suspension or termination of this Contract.



Disallowed Costs

The Contractor is responsible for any audit exceptions or disallowed costs incurred by its own organization or that of its subcontractors.

COMMERCE may, in its sole discretion, withhold ten percent (10%) from each payment until acceptance by COMMERCE of the final report (or completion of the project, etc.).

5. SUBCONTRACTOR DATA COLLECTION

Contractor will submit reports, in a form and format to be provided by Commerce and at intervals as agreed by the parties, regarding work under this Contract performed by subcontractors and the portion of Contract funds expended for work performed by subcontractors, including but not necessarily limited to minority-owned, woman-owned, and veteran-owned business subcontractors. "Subcontractors" shall mean subcontractors of any tier.

6. INSURANCE

Each party certifies that it is self-insured under the State's or local government self-insurance liability program, and shall be responsible for losses for which it is found liable.

7. FRAUD AND OTHER LOSS REPORTING

Contractor shall report in writing all known or suspected fraud or other loss of any funds or other property furnished under this Contract immediately or as soon as practicable to the Commerce Representative identified on the Face Sheet.

8. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

In the event of an inconsistency in this Contract, the inconsistency shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order:

- Applicable federal and state of Washington statutes and regulations
- Special Terms and Conditions
- General Terms and Conditions
- Attachment A Scope of Work
- Attachment B Budget



General Terms and Conditions

1. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

As used throughout this Contract, the following terms shall have the meaning set forth below:

- A. "Authorized Representative" shall mean the Director and/or the designee authorized in writing to act on the Director's behalf.
- B. "COMMERCE" shall mean the Washington Department of Commerce.
- C. "Contract" or "Agreement" or "Grant" means the entire written agreement between COMMERCE and the Contractor, including any Attachments, documents, or materials incorporated by reference. E-mail or Facsimile transmission of a signed copy of this contract shall be the same as delivery of an original.
- D. "Contractor" or "Grantee" shall mean the entity identified on the face sheet performing service(s) under this Contract, and shall include all employees and agents of the Contractor.
- E. "Personal Information" shall mean information identifiable to any person, including, but not limited to, information that relates to a person's name, health, finances, education, business, use or receipt of governmental services or other activities, addresses, telephone numbers, social security numbers, driver license numbers, other identifying numbers, and any financial identifiers, and "Protected Health Information" under the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA).
- F. "State" shall mean the state of Washington.
- **G.** "Subcontractor" shall mean one not in the employment of the Contractor, who is performing all or part of those services under this Contract under a separate contract with the Contractor. The terms "subcontractor" and "subcontractors" mean subcontractor(s) in any tier.

2. ALL WRITINGS CONTAINED HEREIN

This Contract contains all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties. No other understandings, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Contract shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the parties hereto.

3. AMENDMENTS

This Contract may be amended by mutual agreement of the parties. Such amendments shall not be binding unless they are in writing and signed by personnel authorized to bind each of the parties.

4. ASSIGNMENT

Neither this Contract, work thereunder, nor any claim arising under this Contract, shall be transferred or assigned by the Contractor without prior written consent of COMMERCE.

5. CONFIDENTIALITY AND SAFEGUARDING OF INFORMATION

- A. "Confidential Information" as used in this section includes:
 - All material provided to the Contractor by COMMERCE that is designated as "confidential" by COMMERCE;
 - All material produced by the Contractor that is designated as "confidential" by COMMERCE; and



- All Personal Information in the possession of the Contractor that may not be disclosed under state or federal law.
- B. The Contractor shall comply with all state and federal laws related to the use, sharing, transfer, sale, or disclosure of Confidential Information. The Contractor shall use Confidential Information solely for the purposes of this Contract and shall not use, share, transfer, sell or disclose any Confidential Information to any third party except with the prior written consent of COMMERCE or as may be required by law. The Contractor shall take all necessary steps to assure that Confidential Information is safeguarded to prevent unauthorized use, sharing, transfer, sale or disclosure of Confidential Information or violation of any state or federal laws related thereto. Upon request, the Contractor shall provide COMMERCE with its policies and procedures on confidentiality. COMMERCE may require changes to such policies and procedures as they apply to this Contract whenever COMMERCE reasonably determines that changes are necessary to prevent unauthorized disclosures. The Contractor shall make the changes within the time period specified by COMMERCE. Upon request, the Contractor shall immediately return to COMMERCE any Confidential Information that COMMERCE reasonably determines has not been adequately protected by the Contractor against unauthorized disclosure.
- C. Unauthorized Use or Disclosure. The Contractor shall notify COMMERCE within five (5) working days of any unauthorized use or disclosure of any confidential information, and shall take necessary steps to mitigate the harmful effects of such use or disclosure.

COPYRIGHT

Unless otherwise provided, all Materials produced under this Contract shall be considered "works for hire" as defined by the U.S. Copyright Act and shall be owned by COMMERCE. COMMERCE shall be considered the author of such Materials. In the event the Materials are not considered "works for hire" under the U.S. Copyright laws, the Contractor hereby irrevocably assigns all right, title, and interest in all Materials, including all intellectual property rights, moral rights, and rights of publicity to COMMERCE effective from the moment of creation of such Materials.

"Materials" means all items in any format and includes, but is not limited to, data, reports, documents, pamphlets, advertisements, books, magazines, surveys, studies, computer programs, films, tapes, and/or sound reproductions. "Ownership" includes the right to copyright, patent, register and the ability to transfer these rights.

For Materials that are delivered under the Contract, but that incorporate pre-existing materials not produced under the Contract, the Contractor hereby grants to COMMERCE a nonexclusive, royalty-free, irrevocable license (with rights to sublicense to others) in such Materials to translate, reproduce, distribute, prepare derivative works, publicly perform, and publicly display. The Contractor warrants and represents that the Contractor has all rights and permissions, including intellectual property rights, moral rights and rights of publicity, necessary to grant such a license to COMMERCE.

The Contractor shall exert all reasonable effort to advise COMMERCE, at the time of delivery of Materials furnished under this Contract, of all known or potential invasions of privacy contained therein and of any portion of such document which was not produced in the performance of this Contract. The Contractor shall provide COMMERCE with prompt written notice of each notice or claim of infringement received by the Contractor with respect to any Materials delivered under this Contract. COMMERCE shall have the right to modify or remove any restrictive markings placed upon the Materials by the Contractor.

7. DISPUTES

In the event that a dispute arises under this Agreement, it shall be determined by a Dispute Board in the following manner: Each party to this Agreement shall appoint one member to the Dispute Board. The members so appointed shall jointly appoint an additional member to the Dispute Board. The Dispute Board shall review the facts, Agreement terms and applicable statutes and rules and make



a determination of the dispute. The Dispute Board shall thereafter decide the dispute with the majority prevailing. The determination of the Dispute Board shall be final and binding on the parties hereto. As an alternative to this process, either of the parties may request intervention by the Governor, as provided by RCW 43.17.330, in which event the Governor's process will control.

8. GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE

This Contract shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the state of Washington, and the venue of any action brought hereunder shall be in the Superior Court for Thurston County.

9. INDEMNIFICATION

Each party shall be solely responsible for the acts of its employees, officers, and agents.

10. LICENSING, ACCREDITATION AND REGISTRATION

The Contractor shall comply with all applicable local, state, and federal licensing, accreditation and registration requirements or standards necessary for the performance of this Contract.

11. RECAPTURE

In the event that the Contractor fails to perform this Contract in accordance with state laws, federal laws, and/or the provisions of this Contract, COMMERCE reserves the right to recapture funds in an amount to compensate COMMERCE for the noncompliance in addition to any other remedies available at law or in equity.

Repayment by the Contractor of funds under this recapture provision shall occur within the time period specified by COMMERCE. In the alternative, COMMERCE may recapture such funds from payments due under this Contract.

12. RECORDS MAINTENANCE

The Contractor shall maintain books, records, documents, data and other evidence relating to this contract and performance of the services described herein, including but not limited to accounting procedures and practices that sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of any nature expended in the performance of this contract.

The Contractor shall retain such records for a period of six years following the date of final payment. At no additional cost, these records, including materials generated under the contract, shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, review or audit by COMMERCE, personnel duly authorized by COMMERCE, the Office of the State Auditor, and federal and state officials so authorized by law, regulation or agreement.

If any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration of the six (6) year period, the records shall be retained until all litigation, claims, or audit findings involving the records have been resolved.

13. SAVINGS

In the event funding from state, federal, or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date of this Contract and prior to normal completion, COMMERCE may suspend or terminate the Contract under the "Termination for Convenience" clause, without the ten calendar day notice requirement. In lieu of termination, the Contract may be amended to reflect the new funding limitations and conditions.

14. SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this contract are intended to be severable. If any term or provision is illegal or invalid for any reason whatsoever, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the contract.



The Contractor may only subcontract work contemplated under this Contract if it obtains the prior written approval of COMMERCE.

If COMMERCE approves subcontracting, the Contractor shall maintain written procedures related to subcontracting, as well as copies of all subcontracts and records related to subcontracts. For cause, COMMERCE in writing may: (a) require the Contractor to amend its subcontracting procedures as they relate to this Contract; (b) prohibit the Contractor from subcontracting with a particular person or entity; or (c) require the Contractor to rescind or amend a subcontract.

Every subcontract shall bind the Subcontractor to follow all applicable terms of this Contract. The Contractor is responsible to COMMERCE if the Subcontractor fails to comply with any applicable term or condition of this Contract. The Contractor shall appropriately monitor the activities of the Subcontractor to assure fiscal conditions of this Contract. In no event shall the existence of a subcontract operate to release or reduce the liability of the Contractor to COMMERCE for any breach in the performance of the Contractor's duties.

Every subcontract shall include a term that COMMERCE and the State of Washington are not liable for claims or damages arising from a Subcontractor's performance of the subcontract.

16. SURVIVAL

The terms, conditions, and warranties contained in this Contract that by their sense and context are intended to survive the completion of the performance, cancellation or termination of this Contract shall so survive.

17. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE

In the event COMMERCE determines the Contractor has failed to comply with the conditions of this contract in a timely manner, COMMERCE has the right to suspend or terminate this contract. Before suspending or terminating the contract, COMMERCE shall notify the Contractor in writing of the need to take corrective action. If corrective action is not taken within 30 calendar days, the contract may be terminated or suspended.

In the event of termination or suspension, the Contractor shall be liable for damages as authorized by law including, but not limited to, any cost difference between the original contract and the replacement or cover contract and all administrative costs directly related to the replacement contract, e.g., cost of the competitive bidding, mailing, advertising and staff time.

COMMERCE reserves the right to suspend all or part of the contract, withhold further payments, or prohibit the Contractor from incurring additional obligations of funds during investigation of the alleged compliance breach and pending corrective action by the Contractor or a decision by COMMERCE to terminate the contract. A termination shall be deemed a "Termination for Convenience" if it is determined that the Contractor: (1) was not in default; or (2) failure to perform was outside of his or her control, fault or negligence.

The rights and remedies of COMMERCE provided in this contract are not exclusive and are, in addition to any other rights and remedies, provided by law.

18. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE

Except as otherwise provided in this Contract, COMMERCE may, by ten (10) business days' written notice, beginning on the second day after the mailing, terminate this Contract, in whole or in part. If this Contract is so terminated, COMMERCE shall be liable only for payment required under the terms of this Contract for services rendered or goods delivered prior to the effective date of termination.

19. TERMINATION PROCEDURES

Upon termination of this contract, COMMERCE, in addition to any other rights provided in this contract, may require the Contractor to deliver to COMMERCE any property specifically produced or



acquired for the performance of such part of this contract as has been terminated. The provisions of the "Treatment of Assets" clause shall apply in such property transfer.

COMMERCE shall pay to the Contractor the agreed upon price, if separately stated, for completed work and services accepted by COMMERCE, and the amount agreed upon by the Contractor and COMMERCE for (i) completed work and services for which no separate price is stated, (ii) partially completed work and services, (iii) other property or services that are accepted by COMMERCE, and (iv) the protection and preservation of property, unless the termination is for default, in which case the Authorized Representative shall determine the extent of the liability of COMMERCE. Failure to agree with such determination shall be a dispute within the meaning of the "Disputes" clause of this contract. COMMERCE may withhold from any amounts due the Contractor such sum as the Authorized Representative determines to be necessary to protect COMMERCE against potential loss or liability.

The rights and remedies of COMMERCE provided in this section shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this contract.

After receipt of a notice of termination, and except as otherwise directed by the Authorized Representative, the Contractor shall:

- A. Stop work under the contract on the date, and to the extent specified, in the notice;
- **B.** Place no further orders or subcontracts for materials, services, or facilities except as may be necessary for completion of such portion of the work under the contract that is not terminated;
- C. Assign to COMMERCE, in the manner, at the times, and to the extent directed by the Authorized Representative, all of the rights, title, and interest of the Contractor under the orders and subcontracts so terminated, in which case COMMERCE has the right, at its discretion, to settle or pay any or all claims arising out of the termination of such orders and subcontracts;
- D. Settle all outstanding liabilities and all claims arising out of such termination of orders and subcontracts, with the approval or ratification of the Authorized Representative to the extent the Authorized Representative may require, which approval or ratification shall be final for all the purposes of this clause;
- E. Transfer title to COMMERCE and deliver in the manner, at the times, and to the extent directed by the Authorized Representative any property which, if the contract had been completed, would have been required to be furnished to COMMERCE;
- F. Complete performance of such part of the work as shall not have been terminated by the Authorized Representative; and
- **G.** Take such action as may be necessary, or as the Authorized Representative may direct, for the protection and preservation of the property related to this contract, which is in the possession of the Contractor and in which COMMERCE has or may acquire an interest.

20. TREATMENT OF ASSETS

Title to all property furnished by COMMERCE shall remain in COMMERCE. Title to all property furnished by the Contractor, for the cost of which the Contractor is entitled to be reimbursed as a direct item of cost under this contract, shall pass to and vest in COMMERCE upon delivery of such property by the Contractor. Title to other property, the cost of which is reimbursable to the Contractor under this contract, shall pass to and vest in COMMERCE upon (i) issuance for use of such property in the performance of this contract, or (ii) commencement of use of such property in the performance of this contract, or (iii) reimbursement of the cost thereof by COMMERCE in whole or in part, whichever first occurs.



- A. Any property of COMMERCE furnished to the Contractor shall, unless otherwise provided herein or approved by COMMERCE, be used only for the performance of this contract.
- **B.** The Contractor shall be responsible for any loss or damage to property of COMMERCE that results from the negligence of the Contractor or which results from the failure on the part of the Contractor to maintain and administer that property in accordance with sound management practices.
- C. If any COMMERCE property is lost, destroyed or damaged, the Contractor shall immediately notify COMMERCE and shall take all reasonable steps to protect the property from further damage.
- **D.** The Contractor shall surrender to COMMERCE all property of COMMERCE prior to settlement upon completion, termination or cancellation of this contract.
- E. All reference to the Contractor under this clause shall also include Contractor's employees, agents or Subcontractors.

21. WAIVER

Waiver of any default or breach shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent default or breach. Any waiver shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Contract unless stated to be such in writing and signed by Authorized Representative of COMMERCE.

Background/Findings/Facts: As a code city, Selah is authorized – by state law – to grant nonexclusive franchise rights to any person or entity that desires to use a portion of the City's public infrastructure for certain purposes. The permissible purposes include the transmission and distribution of signals and other methods of communication. See RCW 35A.47.040 (1st ¶).

The entity known as Consolidated Communications of Washington Company, LLC, desires to obtain a nonexclusive franchise, so that it can locate telecommunications facilities both underground and above ground at various locations on City-owned rights-of-way. This would occur pursuant to a six-page Telecommunications Franchise Agreement, a proposed copy of which is submitted with this AIS. The terms are acceptable to City staff. The City will not incur any financial outlay under the Agreement. Nor will the City receive any annual franchise fee payments, because state law prohibits the City from charging such due to the fact that the applicant's fiber optic cables will be used – at least in part – for telephone services. See RCW 35.21.860 & 82.16.010.

During the City Council meeting on November 28, 2023, Resolution No. 3063 was passed and adopted. That Resolution directed City staff to publish notice in the City's designated official newspaper of the City Council's intent to likely grant the proposed franchise on December 12, 2023. This was done so as to satisfy the prerequisites established by RCW 35A.47.040 (2nd ¶). In fact, notice was published in the Yakima Herald-Republic on December 3, 2023.

Today, the City Council can take final action. City staff asks the City Council to pass and adopt the now-submitted proposed Resolution, which authorizes the Mayor to sign the six-page Agreement and to thus grant the franchise.

TELECOMMUNICATION FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

This Telecommunications Franchise Agreement ("AGREEMENT" or "FRANCHISE") is entered into by and between **Consolidated Communications of Washington Company**, **LLC** ("FRANCHISEE") and the municipal corporation of the **City of Selah**, **Washington** ("CITY").

RECITALS

WHEREAS the CITY also recognizes that the use of public rights-of-way must be restricted to allow for the construction of amenities necessary to serve the needs within the CITY for all parcels located within the CITY. The coordination, planning, and management of the CITY'S rights-of-way is necessary to ensure that the burden of costs for the operations of non-municipal interests are not borne by the citizenry; and

WHEREAS, the CITY has determined that the development of a comprehensive plan for rights-of-way use, and management is the most effective means for managing the current use of rights-of-way and ensuring prudent and appropriate decisions concerning the use of rights-of-way in the future; and

WHEREAS, FRANCHISEE has determined that it is in its best interests to move forward with the installation and maintenance of telecommunications facilities within the public rights-of-way of CITY.

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1. Non-exclusive Franchise Granted</u>. CITY hereby grants to FRANCHISEE, subject to the conditions prescribed in this AGREEMENT, the franchise rights and authority to construct, replace, repair, monitor, maintain, use, and operate the equipment and facilities necessary for telecommunication service crossing, within the CITY-owned rights-of-way ("FRANCHISE AREA").

Such franchise rights and authority shall not be deemed to be exclusive to FRANCHISEE and shall in no way prohibit or limit the CITY's ability to grant other franchises, permits, or rights along, over, or under the areas to which this FRANCHISE has been granted to FRANCHISEE; provided that, any other franchise(s) do not unreasonably interfere with FRANCHISEE'S exercise of its franchise rights and authority. This FRANCHISE shall in no way interfere with existing utilities or in any way limit, prohibit, or prevent, the CITY from using the FRANCHISE AREA or affect the CITY'S jurisdiction over any area in any way.

<u>Section 2. Authority</u>. The CITY'S Director of Public Works or his/her designee is hereby granted the authority to administer and enforce the terms and provisions of this FRANCHISE and may develop such rules, policies, and procedures, as he/she deems necessary to carry out the provisions contained herein.

<u>Section 3. Construction Provisions and Standards</u>. The following provisions shall be considered mandatory and failure to abide by any conditions described herein shall be deemed as non-compliance with the terms of this FRANCHISE:

- A. Permit Required No construction, maintenance, or repairs (except for emergency repairs) shall be undertaken in the FRANCHISE AREA without first obtaining a permit to perform such work from CITY'S Public Works Department.
- B. Coordination All work and inspection shall be coordinated with the Engineering Division of CITY'S Public Works Department to ensure consistency with CITY'S infrastructure, CITY'S future capital improvement projects, all developer improvements, and pertinent codes and franchises.
- C. Construction Standards Any construction, installation, maintenance, and restoration activities performed by or for FRANCHISEE within the FRANCHISE AREA shall be conducted and located so as to produce the least amount of interference with the free passage of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. All construction, installation, maintenance, traffic control and restoration activities shall be conducted so as to conform to CITY'S most-current standards in effect at the time that such activities take place, and as may detailed in a Manual on Accommodating Utilities.
- D. Undergrounding The parties agree that this FRANCHISE does not limit the CITY'S authority under federal law, state law or local ordinance, to require the undergrounding of utilities or other facilities. FRANCHISEE shall not be required to convert existing facilities or install new facilities underground in any areas where other service providers (e.g., power, cable, telecommunications, etc.) have aerial facilities.
- E. Removal or Abandonment Upon the removal from service of any telecommunication components or other associated structures, facilities and amenities, FRANCHISEE shall comply with all applicable standards and requirements prescribed by CITY'S Public Works Department for the removal or abandonment of said structures and telecommunication service facilities.
- F. "One-Call" Location & Liability CITY will not locate private infrastructure. The "One-Call" locate will be the responsibility of the FRANCHISEE.
- **G. As-Built Plans Required -** FRANCHISEE shall present as-built plans to be inspected and approved by CITY'S Public Works Director or his/her designee.
- H. Protect Public Interest FRANCHISEE understands and agrees that the Selah Municipal Code incorporates provisions necessary to protect the public interest and investment with regard to utilization of CITY-owned roads and rights-of-way.
- I. Relocation Whenever CITY determines that it is necessary for any of FRANCHISEE'S facilities, or for other system components, to be moved or relocated to accommodate the construction, or enhancement of any CITY-owned public amenity in the FRANCHISE AREA, CITY shall notify FRANCHISEE in writing of such determination, and FRANCHISEE shall promptly submit plans for such relocation. Within ninety (90) days of the approval by CITY of the plans for relocation, FRANCHISEE shall relocate those facilities or structures designated by CITY. The costs of moving or relocating FRANCHISEE facilities

or structures, including but not limited to costs for design, engineering and construction is the responsibility of FRANCHISEE.

Section 4. Franchise Compliance.

- A. Franchise Violations The failure by FRANCHISEE to comply fully with any of the provisions of this AGREEMENT may result in a written notice from CITY, which describes the violation(s) and requests remedial action within thirty (30) days of receipt of such notice. If FRANCHISEE has not attained full compliance at the end of the thirty (30) day period following receipt of the violation notification, CITY may declare an immediate termination of all franchise rights and authority, provided that full compliance was reasonably possible within that thirty (30) day period. The demonstration of due diligence on the part of FRANCHISEE may be grounds for the grant of an extension in the period during which compliance is to be attained; provided that, FRANCHISEE continues to pursue correction of any violation(s) of the AGREEMENT that are or were noted by CITY.
- B. Emergency Actions - If any of FRANCHISEE'S actions, or any failure by FRANCHISEE to act, to correct a situation caused by FRANCHISEE is deemed by CITY to create a threat to life or property, CITY may order FRANCHISEE to immediately correct said situation threat or, at CITY'S discretion, CITY may undertake measures to correct said situation threat itself; provided that, when possible, CITY shall notify FRANCHISEE of said threat and give FRANCHISEE an opportunity to correct said threat before undertaking such measures itself. FRANCHISEE shall be liable for all costs, expenses, and damages attributable to the correction of such an emergency situation as undertaken by CITY to the extent that such situation was caused by FRANCHISEE, and shall further be liable for all costs, expenses, and damages resulting to CITY from such situation and any reimbursement of such costs to CITY shall be made within thirty (30) days of written notice of the completion of such action or determination of damages by CITY. The failure by FRANCHISEE to take appropriate action to correct a situation caused by FRANCHISEE and identified by CITY as a threat to public or private safety or property shall be considered a violation of this FRANCHISE and each day that such a situation continues to exist and FRANCHISEE fails to take appropriate action to abate said situation shall be regarded as a separate violation.
- C. Other Remedies Nothing contained in this FRANCHISE shall limit CITY'S available remedies in the event if FRANCHISEE fails to comply with the provisions of this FRANCHISE, including but not limited to, CITY'S right to sue for specific performance and/or damages.
- **D.** Removal of System In the event that this FRANCHISE is terminated as a result of violation(s), FRANCHISEE shall at its sole expense, promptly remove all components and facilities, provided that, CITY, at its discretion, may allow FRANCHISEE to abandon its facilities in place.

<u>Section 5. Insurance</u>. FRANCHISEE shall present to CITY proof that FRANCHISEE has general liability insurance in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) in the single event and two million dollars (\$2,000,000) in the aggregate.

<u>Section 6. Other Permits & Approvals</u>. Nothing in this FRANCHISE shall relieve FRANCHISEE from any obligation to obtain approvals or necessary permits from applicable federal, state, and CITY authorities for all activities in the FRANCHISE AREA.

<u>Section 7. FRANCHISEE'S Successors</u>. The rights, privileges, benefits, title, or interest provided by this FRANCHISE shall automatically transfer to any assign(s) or successor(s) in interest of FRANCHISEE and, in such event, each instance of the word and reference to the position of "Franchisee" within this AGREEMENT shall henceforth be read, construed and interpreted as stating the name of the successor(s).

<u>Section 8. Franchise Term</u>. The franchise rights and authority granted by this FRANCHISE shall remain in full force and effect for a period of fifteen (15) years from the effective date of this FRANCHISEE and will be renegotiable at the end of that time.

Section 9. Administrative Fees. (NOT APPLICABLE)

Section 10. Franchise Fee. (NOT APPLICABLE)

Section 11. Capacity for CITY Use. As long as FRANCHISEE is in compliance and good standing with CITY, any new expansion into a new service area within the City of Selah will be subject to substantially the same terms and conditions set forth in this FRANCHISE and such permission will be given within sixty (60) days following notice by FRANCHISEE to CITY'S Public Works Director. However, if FRANCHISEE is not in compliance and good standing with CITY, prior to expanding into a new service area within the City of Selah, FRANCHISEE shall contact CITY'S Public Works Department and provide notice of the proposed area of expansion and negotiations shall then occur between FRANCHISEE and CITY on specific public benefit projects within the proposed expanded service area. FRANCHISEE and CITY will agree on the specific public benefit within the proposed expanded service area prior to FRANCHISEE obtaining a right-of-way use permit for action within the expanded service area.

<u>Section 12. Notices</u>. Any notices to be served upon CITY or FRANCHISEE shall be delivered to the following addresses respectively:

Section 13. Claims for Damages. In the construction, installation, repair, operation, and maintenance of its structures and facilities, FRANCHISEE shall use reasonable and appropriate precautions to avoid damage to persons or property. FRANCHISEE shall indemnify, hold harmless, and also defend CITY and its officers, agents, employees, insurers and liability risk pools from all claims, actions or damages of every kind or description, including reasonable attorney's and expert witness fees, which may accrue to or be suffered by any person or persons, corporation or property to the extent caused in part or in whole by any negligent act or omission of FRANCHISEE, its officers, agents, employees and contractors, carried on in the furtherance of the rights, benefits, and privileges granted to FRANCHISEE by this FRANCHISE. In the event any claim or demand is presented to or filed with the CITY which gives rise to FRANCHISEE'S obligation(s) pursuant to this section, CITY shall within a reasonable time notify FRANCHISEE thereof and FRANCHISEE shall have a right, at its election, to settle or compromise such claim or demand. In the event any claim or action is commenced in which CITY is named as a party, and which suit or action is based on a claim or demand which gives rise to FRANCHISEE'S obligation(s) pursuant to this section, CITY shall promptly notify FRANCHISEE thereof, and FRANCHISEE shall, at its sole cost and expense, defend such suit or action by attorneys of its own election. In defense of such suit or action, FRANCHISEE may, at its election and at its sole cost and expense, settle or compromise such suit or action. This section shall not be construed to require FRANCHISEE to: (i) protect and save CITY harmless from any claims, actions, or damages; (ii) settle or compromise any claim, demand, suit, or action; (iii) appear in or defend any suit or action; or, (iv) pay any judgment or reimburse the CITY'S costs and expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees), to the extent such claim arises out of the sole negligence of CITY. To the extent of any concurrent negligence between FRANCHISEE and CITY, FRANCHISEE'S obligations under this section shall only extend to its own share of negligence or fault. CITY shall have the right at all times to participate through its own attorney in any suit or action which arises out of any right, privilege, and authority granted by or exercised pursuant to this FRANCHISE when CITY determines that such participation is required to protect the interests of CITY or the public. Such participation by CITY shall be at CITY'S sole cost and expense.

Section 14. Severability. If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this FRANCHISE is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, CITY may, at its sole discretion, deem the entire FRANCHISE to be affected and thereby nullified. However, in the event that a determination is made that a section, sentence, clause, or phrase in this FRANCHISE is invalid or unconstitutional, CITY may elect to treat the portion declared invalid or unconstitutional as severable and enforce the remaining provisions of this FRANCHISE; provided that, if CITY elects to enforce the remaining provisions of the FRANCHISE, FRANCHISE shall have the option to terminate the FRANCHISE.

Section 15. Indemnification. FRANCHISEE, and each of its successors and assigns, agrees and covenants to indemnify and hold harmless CITY from and against any and all liability, loss, cost, damages, whether to persons or property, or expense of any type or nature, including reasonable attorney's fees and expert witness fees, to the extent it arises from any negligent act or omission or willful misconduct of FRANCHISEE or one of its successors or assigns, arising from or connected to work under this FRANCHISE; provided however, that in case any suit or action is instituted against CITY by reason of any such damage or injury, CITY shall: (i) cause written notice thereof to be given unto FRANCHISEE; (ii) provide all reasonably requested assistance in defense or settlement of such claim at FRANCHISEE'S expense; and, (iii) retain the right to control the defense of settlement or such claims.

Section 17. Other Conditions: (None)

This FRANCHISE is not valid until accepted and signed by FRANCHISEE.

STATE OF WASHINGTON TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT BOARD AND City of Selah AGREEMENT

THIS GRANT AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement") for the E Goodlander Road Signal, Landcaster Rd Signal (hereinafter "Project") is entered into by the WASHINGTON STATE TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT BOARD (hereinafter "TIB") and City of Selah, a political subdivision of the State of Washington (hereinafter "RECIPIENT").

1.0 PURPOSE

For the project specified above, TIB shall pay 90.0000 percent of approved eligible project costs up to the amount of \$612,810, pursuant to terms contained in the RECIPIENT'S Grant Application, supporting documentation, chapter 47.26 RCW, title 479 WAC, and the terms and conditions listed below.

2.0 SCOPE AND BUDGET

The Project Scope and Budget are initially described in RECIPIENT's Grant Application and incorporated by reference into this Agreement. Scope and Budget will be further developed and refined, but not substantially altered during the Design, Bid Authorization and Construction Phases. Any material alterations to the original Project Scope or Budget as initially described in the Grant Application must be authorized by TIB in advance by written amendment.

3.0 PROJECT DOCUMENTATION

TIB requires RECIPIENT to make reasonable progress and submit timely Project documentation as applicable throughout the Project. Upon RECIPIENT's submission of each Project document to TIB, the terms contained in the document will be incorporated by reference into the Agreement. Required documents include, but are not limited to the following:

- a) Project Funding Status Form
- b) Bid Authorization Form with plans and engineers estimate
- c) Award Updated Cost Estimate
- d) Bid Tabulations
- e) Contract Completion Updated Cost Estimate with final summary of quantities
- f) Project Accounting History

4.0 BILLING AND PAYMENT

The local agency shall submit progress billings as project costs are incurred to enable TIB to maintain accurate budgeting and fund management. Payment requests may be submitted as

often as the RECIPIENT deems necessary, but shall be submitted at least quarterly if billable amounts are greater than \$50,000. If progress billings are not submitted, large payments may be delayed or scheduled in a payment plan.

5.0 TERM OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall be effective upon execution by TIB and shall continue through closeout of the grant or until terminated as provided herein, but shall not exceed 10 years unless amended by the Parties.

6.0 AMENDMENTS

This Agreement may be amended by mutual agreement of the Parties. Such amendments shall not be binding unless they are in writing and signed by persons authorized to bind each of the Parties.

7.0 ASSIGNMENT

The RECIPIENT shall not assign or transfer its rights, benefits, or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of TIB. The RECIPIENT is deemed to consent to assignment of this Agreement by TIB to a successor entity. Such consent shall not constitute a waiver of the RECIPIENT's other rights under this Agreement.

8.0 GOVERNANCE & VENUE

This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the state of Washington and venue of any action brought hereunder shall be in the Superior Court for Thurston County.

9.0 DEFAULT AND TERMINATION

9.1 NON-COMPLIANCE

- a) In the event TIB determines, in its sole discretion, the RECIPIENT has failed to comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, TIB shall notify the RECIPIENT, in writing, of the non-compliance.
- b) In response to the notice, RECIPIENT shall provide a written response within 10 business days of receipt of TIB's notice of non-compliance, which should include either a detailed plan to correct the non-compliance, a request to amend the Project, or a denial accompanied by supporting details.
- c) TIB will provide 30 days for RECIPIENT to make reasonable progress toward compliance pursuant to its plan to correct or implement its amendment to the Project.
- d) Should RECIPIENT dispute non-compliance, TIB will investigate the dispute and may withhold further payments or prohibit the RECIPIENT from incurring additional reimbursable costs during the investigation.

9.2 DEFAULT

RECIPIENT may be considered in default if TIB determines, in its sole discretion, that:

- RECIPIENT is not making reasonable progress toward correction and compliance.
- b) TIB denies the RECIPIENT's request to amend the Project.
- c) After investigation TIB confirms RECIPIENT'S non-compliance.

TIB reserves the right to order RECIPIENT to immediately stop work on the Project and TIB may stop Project payments until the requested corrections have been made or the Agreement has been terminated.

9.3 TERMINATION

- a) In the event of default by the RECIPIENT as determined pursuant to Section 9.2, TIB shall serve RECIPIENT with a written notice of termination of this Agreement, which shall be served in person, by email or by certified letter. Upon service of notice of termination, the RECIPIENT shall immediately stop work and/or take such action as may be directed by TIB.
- b) In the event of default and/or termination by either PARTY, the RECIPIENT may be liable for damages as authorized by law including, but not limited to, repayment of grant funds.
- c) The rights and remedies of TIB provided in the AGREEMENT are not exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law.

9.4 TERMINATION FOR NECESSITY

TIB may, with ten (10) days written notice, terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, because funds are no longer available for the purpose of meeting TIB's obligations. If this Agreement is so terminated, TIB shall be liable only for payment required under this Agreement for performance rendered or costs incurred prior to the effective date of termination.

10.0 USE OF TIB GRANT FUNDS

TIB grant funds come from Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax revenue. Any use of these funds for anything other than highway or roadway system improvements is prohibited and shall subject the RECIPIENT to the terms, conditions and remedies set forth in Section 9. If Right of Way is purchased using TIB funds, and some or all of the Right of Way is subsequently sold, proceeds from the sale must be deposited into the RECIPIENT's motor vehicle fund and used for a motor vehicle purpose.

11.0 INCREASE OR DECREASE IN TIB GRANT FUNDS

At Bid Award and Contract Completion, RECIPIENT may request an increase in the maximum payable TIB funds for the specific project. Requests must be made in writing and will be considered by TIB and awarded at the sole discretion of TIB. All increase requests must be made pursuant to WAC 479-05-202 and/or WAC 479-01-060. If an increase is denied, the recipient shall be liable for all costs incurred in excess of the maximum amount payable by TIB. In the event that final costs related to the specific project are less than the initial grant award, TIB funds will be decreased and/or refunded to TIB in a manner that maintains the intended ratio between TIB funds and total project costs, as described in Section 1.0 of this Agreement.



12.0 INDEPENDENT CAPACITY

The RECIPIENT shall be deemed an independent contractor for all purposes and the employees of the RECIPIENT or any of its contractors, subcontractors, and employees thereof shall not in any manner be deemed employees of TIB.

13.0 INDEMNIFICATION AND HOLD HARMLESS

The PARTIES agree to the following:

Each of the PARTIES, shall protect, defend, indemnify, and save harmless the other PARTY, its officers, officials, employees, and agents, while acting within the scope of their employment as such, from any and all costs, claims, judgment, and/or awards of damages, arising out of, or in any way resulting from, that PARTY's own negligent acts or omissions which may arise in connection with its performance under this Agreement. No PARTY will be required to indemnify, defend, or save harmless the other PARTY if the claim, suit, or action for injuries. death, or damages is caused by the sole negligence of the other PARTY. Where such claims, suits, or actions result from the concurrent negligence of the PARTIES, the indemnity provisions provided herein shall be valid and enforceable only to the extent of a PARTY's own negligence. Each of the PARTIES agrees that its obligations under this subparagraph extend to any claim, demand and/or cause of action brought by, or on behalf of, any of its employees or agents. For this purpose, each of the PARTIES, by mutual negotiation, hereby waives, with respect to the other PARTY only, any immunity that would otherwise be available to it against such claims under the Industrial Insurance provision of Title 51 RCW. In any action to enforce the provisions of the Section, the prevailing PARTY shall be entitled to recover its reasonable attorney's fees and costs incurred from the other PARTY. The obligations of this Section shall survive termination of this Agreement.

14.0 DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- a) The PARTIES shall make good faith efforts to quickly and collaboratively resolve any dispute arising under or in connection with this AGREEMENT. The dispute resolution process outlined in this Section applies to disputes arising under or in connection with the terms of this AGREEMENT.
- b) Informal Resolution. The PARTIES shall use their best efforts to resolve disputes promptly and at the lowest organizational level.
- c) In the event that the PARTIES are unable to resolve the dispute, the PARTIES shall submit the matter to non-binding mediation facilitated by a mutually agreed upon mediator. The PARTIES shall share equally in the cost of the mediator.
- d) Each PARTY agrees to compromise to the fullest extent possible in resolving the dispute in order to avoid delays or additional incurred cost to the Project.
- e) The PARTIES agree that they shall have no right to seek relief in a court of law until and unless the Dispute Resolution process has been exhausted.



15.0 ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement, together with the RECIPIENT'S Grant Application, the provisions of chapter 47.26 Revised Code of Washington, the provisions of title 479 Washington Administrative Code, and TIB Policies, constitutes the entire agreement between the PARTIES and supersedes all previous written or oral agreements between the PARTIES.

16.0 RECORDS MAINTENANCE

The RECIPIENT shall maintain books, records, documents, data and other evidence relating to this Agreement and performance of the services described herein, including but not limited to accounting procedures and practices which sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of any nature expended in the performance of this Agreement. RECIPIENT shall retain such records for a period of six years following the date of final payment. At no additional cost, these records, including materials generated under the Agreement shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, review or audit by TIB personnel duly authorized by TIB, the Office of the State Auditor, and federal and state officials so authorized by law, regulation or agreement.

If any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration of the six (6) year period, the records shall be retained until all litigation, claims, or audit findings involving the records have been resolved.

RESOLUTION NO. 3069

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF SELAH, WASHINGTON, PERTAINING TO SEWER RATES

WHEREAS, Chapter 9.10.060 of the Selah Municipal Code provides that rates for Sewer Utility services be set by resolution of the City Council from time to time; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that a revision in the Sewer Rate structure is appropriate;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SELAH, WASHINGTON, as follows:

RESIDENTIAL RATES

- A. Single-family dwellings and multi-family units of four units or less shall be charged a rate of seventy-two dollars and forty cents (\$72.40) per month, provided water or sewer service is requested and connection has been made.
- B. Multi-residential dwellings consisting of more than four units on one parcel of land, including, but not limited to, multiplexes, apartments and multi-unit residential complexes, served collectively or independently, shall be charged fifty dollars and sixty-five cents (\$50.65) per unit per month without consideration to occupancy status.
- C. Multi-family dwellings, including guest and sleeping rooms, shall be charged seventy-two dollars and forty cents (\$72.40) per unit of family capacity, per month, without consideration to occupancy status. Family capacity is based on the number of beds, where three beds are considered equal to one unit of family capacity.
- D. Multi-residential developments, including manufactured housing parks, condominium and townhouse developments, and residential development complexes served collectively or independently, shall be charged seventy-two dollars and forty cents (\$72.40) per unit, or space, per month without consideration to occupancy status.
- E. Low-Income Senior Citizens and Low-Income Disabled Persons Occupant Rate.
 - (1) Single-family dwellings shall be charged a rate of forty-three dollars and forty-four cents (\$43.44) per month, per dwelling, regardless of occupancy, provided water or sewer service is requested and connection has been made.
 - (2) A senior citizen is a person who occupies a dwelling unit and is sixty-two years of age or older.

(3) A low-income senior citizen shall be a senior citizen whose income, combined with the income of other household occupants, if any, for the calendar year preceding was less than:

- (4) A disabled person is a person who occupies a dwelling unit and qualifies for special parking privileges under RCW 46.16.381(1)(a) through (f) or a blind person as defined in RCW 74.18.020(4) or developmentally disabled as defined in RCW 71A.10.020(2) or a mentally ill person as defined in RCW 71.05.020(1).
- (5) A low-income disabled person shall be a disabled person whose income, combined with other household occupants, if any, for the calendar year preceding was less than:

- (6) Combined income shall be income from all sources and any gain realized by any person from the sale, transfer, or upon being displaced from, his or her residence shall not be considered as income for the purposes of this section, if reinvested in a replacement residence within eighteen (18) months of its realization.
- (7) Determination of eligibility shall be made by the City Clerk-Treasurer based upon the annual statement of the low-income senior citizen or low-income disabled person, or any other reasonable and verifiable means at the discretion of the Clerk-Treasurer.
- F. Outside utility residential user accounts shall pay one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the applicable sewer service rates charged to all City residents.

2. COMMERCIAL/BUSINESS RATES

A. Commercial/business accounts shall be charged based on the volume and strength of wastewater discharged into the City sewage system. Volume shall be determined through metered water consumption. The strength of wastewater will be determined based on the type of commercial/business activity. For commercial/businesses not

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- listed in the categories below, the Public Works Director shall determine which category is most closely related to the commercial/business account.
- B. <u>Category A</u> This category applies to those commercial and business establishments maintaining only restroom facilities for employees and the public, and for hotels and motels without a restaurant that discharges to the same service line. These establishments generally discharge wastewater with a strength of 200 mg/l BOD and 200 mg/l TSS. The domestic sewer charge shall be based upon metered water consumption, and shall be three dollars and seventy-nine cents (\$3.79) per one hundred cubic feet, but not less than sixty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$65.77) per establishment, per month.
- C. <u>Category B</u> This category applies to those commercial and business establishments such as convenience stores, sandwich shops, coffee shops, hotels and motels with a restaurant, and assisted living facilities. These establishments generally discharge wastewater with a strength of 400 mg/l BOD and 400 mg/l TSS. The domestic sewer charge shall be based upon metered water consumption, and shall be six dollars and seventy-four cents (\$6.74) per one hundred cubic feet, but not less than seventy-six dollars and seventy-six cents (\$76.76) per establishment, per month.
- D. <u>Category C</u> This category applies to those commercial and business establishments such as restaurants, pizza shops, bakeries, fast food/drive-in restaurants, and supermarkets. These establishments generally discharge wastewater with a strength of 800 mg/l BOD and 800 mg/l TSS. The domestic sewer charge shall be based upon metered water consumption, and shall be eleven dollars and eighty-four cents (\$11.84) per one hundred cubic feet, but not less than seventy-six dollars and seventy-six cents (\$76.76) per establishment, per month.
- E. Where multiple commercial and business establishments are tenants in a single building and are served by a common water meter, and have a single account with the City, domestic waste charges shall be based upon metered water consumption, and shall be at the rate determined by the City for the highest BOD and TSS values of the users discharging to the sewer, but not less than sixty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$65.77) per establishment, per month. If commercial and business establishments are served by separate water meters, then each establishment shall be charged at the appropriate rate specified within this section, but not less than sixty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$65.77) per meter, per month.
- F. Where multiple commercial and business establishments are tenants in a single building and are served by a common water meter, and each establishment has a separate account with the City, domestic waste charges shall be based upon metered water consumption at the rate determined by the City for the highest BOD and TSS values of the users discharging to the sewer, but not less than sixty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$65.77) per establishment, per month. Billing amounts in excess of the minimum shall be distributed equally between the establishments connected to the meter.

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- G. Where residential and commercial uses are jointly served by a common water meter, each residential dwelling unit shall be charged seventy-two dollars and forty cents (\$72.40), per unit, per month, and be allotted three hundred cubic feet of water per month per residential dwelling unit. Each business establishment shall be charged a minimum of sixty-five dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$65.77) per unit, per month. Water metered in excess of three hundred cubic feet per residential unit shall be considered commercial consumption, and the appropriate commercial rate described above as determined by the City shall be applied.
- H. Commercial/business users who lose water through evaporation, irrigation, or in the product, may request a reduction in their monthly sewer charge only if the difference between water consumed and wastewater discharged to the City is documented through the use of water meters. In such a situation, the monthly sewer charges will be based upon the volume of wastewater discharged to the City at the appropriate rate specified within this section.
- I. Outside utility commercial/business sewer accounts shall pay one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the applicable sewer service rates charged to City commercial/business users.

GOVERNMENT RATES

- A. Unless otherwise noted below, governmental sewer accounts shall be charged at Commercial/Business Rates as described in Section 2. The Public Works Director shall determine which category of Commercial/Business rates shall apply to the governmental sewer account.
- B. <u>Schools</u> Schools shall be charged for sewer service based upon metered water consumption at the rate of ten dollars and seventy-one cents (\$10.71) per one hundred cubic feet, but not less than three hundred eighty-three dollars and seventy-two cents (\$383.72) per month per metered account.
- C. <u>Yakima Valley School</u> Yakima Valley School shall be charged for sewer service based upon metered water consumption at the rate of twelve dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$12.58) per one hundred cubic feet, but not less than twelve hundred eighty-two dollars and seventy-three cents (\$1,282.73) per month. Residential dwelling units associated with the Yakima Valley School and served by separate water meters shall be charged for sewer service at the residential rate set forth in Section 1.
- D. Outside utility governmental user accounts shall pay one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the applicable sewer service rates charged to City government users.

4. INDUSTRIAL RATES

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Industrial users of City wastewater facilities shall be evaluated and determined by the City as to whether monitoring stations on wastewater discharges will be required. If monitoring stations are required by the City, the City shall designate when, where, and how many stations shall be placed. City-approved monitoring stations shall be installed and maintained continuously in satisfactory and effective operation by, and at the expense of, the industrial user, at the direction of the City.

A. General Industrial User Conditions

The following conditions apply to all industrial users discharging to the City wastewater facilities:

- (1) There shall be no unmetered sources of water contributing wastewater to the City sewage works without the knowledge and prior written approval of the City.
- (2) The City reserves the right to test, monitor, and control any wastewater discharged to any City facility at any time, including the right set forth in Selah Code Section 9.10.072.
- The discharges of industrial users may be restricted to a capacity allocated in (3) an industrial discharge contract with the City, or a State or NPDES Waste Discharge Permit issued to the user by the Washington Department of Ecology, whichever results in the smaller capacity. In the event the discharge from an industrial user exceeds that allocated, then a rate surcharge shall be assessed. Such a surcharge shall only be assessed when the discharge exceeds that allocated to the industrial user on an average monthly basis for any of the three components that comprise the rate determination (flow, BOD, and TSS). The surcharge shall only be applied to that portion of the component that is in excess of the industrial user's allocation, and shall be equal to one hundred twenty-five percent (125%) of the rate for that component. For example, if an industrial user's discharge is within the allocated limits for flow and BOD. but exceeds the TSS allocated limit by 100 pounds per day on an average monthly basis, then that excess 100 pounds per day times the number of days in the month shall be charged a rate equal to 125% of the per pound TSS rate.
- (4) Industrial users who lose water through evaporation, irrigation, or in the product, may request a reduction in their monthly sewer charge only if the difference between water consumed and wastewater discharged to the City is documented using water meters. In such a situation, the monthly sewer charges will be based upon the volume of wastewater discharged to City wastewater facilities at the appropriate rate specified within this section.
- (5) The pH of discharges from all industrial users discharging liquids into the public sewers other than the industrial pretreatment system shall not be lower than 6.0 nor greater than 9.0 as determined by monitoring station results. Any discharge of waste outside this range shall be subject to a penalty of two hundred fifty-seven dollars and thirty-six cents (\$257.36) per day. For the

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purposes of this monetary penalty, each day's discharge shall be considered a separate event.

- (6) In the event characteristics of the wastewater as determined by the monitoring station results are not available due to an equipment malfunction, failed laboratory test, or other unforeseen circumstance, then the quantities of flow, BOD, and TSS shall be determined as follows:
 - a. The quantity of wastewater flow shall be based on one of the following methods as determined by the City to be effective and representative for the month when data or results are not available:
 - i. The wastewater flow shall be equal to the flow for the same month in the previous year times the average flow for the previous twelve (12) months divided by the average flow for the twelve (12) month period preceding the month used from the previous year. For example, if the quantity of flow is not available in October 2017, then the flow would be calculated as follows:

October 2017 flow = (October 2016 flow) x (Average daily flow Oct 2016 through Sept 2017)
(Average daily flow Oct 2015 through Sept 2016)

ii. The wastewater flow shall be equal to the total water flow into the user, as determined by water meter readings for the user, times a conversion factor determined by dividing the wastewater flows for the previous twelve (12) months by the water meter readings for the previous twelve (12) months. For example, if the quantity of flow is not available in October 2017, then the flow would be calculated as follows:

October 2017 flow = (October 2017 water flow) x (Oct 2016 through Sept 2017 wastewater flow)
(Oct 2016 through Sept 2017 water flow)

- iii. The wastewater flow shall be equal to the total water flow into the user, as determined by water meter readings for the user, times a conversion factor determined by the City performing a quantitative water balance through the users process to develop a relationship between water consumption and wastewater discharge.
- iv. The wastewater flow shall be determined by any other method deemed acceptable to the City.
- b. The quantity of BOD shall be based on one of the following methods as determined by the City to be effective and representative for the month when data or results are not available:

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i. The BOD concentration shall be equal to the BOD concentration for the same month in the previous year times the average BOD concentration for the previous twelve (12) months divided by the average BOD concentration for the twelve (12) month period preceding the month used from the previous year. For example, if the BOD concentration is not available in October 2017, then the BOD concentration would be calculated as follows:

October 2017 BOD = (October 2016 BOD) x (Average BOD concentration Oct 2016 through Sept 2017)

(Average BOD concentration Oct 2015 through Sept 2016)

- ii. The BOD concentration shall be equal to the BOD concentration for the previous month.
- iii. The BOD concentration shall be determined by any other method deemed acceptable to the City.
- c. The quantity of TSS shall be based on one of the following methods as determined by the City to be effective and representative for the month when data or results are not available:
 - i. The TSS concentration (conc.) shall be equal to the TSS concentration for the same month in the previous year times the average TSS concentration for the previous twelve (12) months divided by the average TSS concentration for the twelve (12) month period preceding the month used from the previous year. For example, if the TSS concentration is not available in October 2017, then the TSS concentration would be calculated as follows:

October 2017 TSS = (October 2016 TSS) x (Average TSS concentration Oct 2016 through Sept 2017)
(Average TSS concentration Oct 2015 through Sept 2016)

- ii. The TSS concentration shall be equal to the TSS concentration for the previous month.
- iii. The TSS concentration shall be determined by any other method deemed acceptable to the City.
- (7) The City shall charge monetary penalties for any discharge from an industrial user that meets the criteria of an excessive industrial discharge as defined in Selah Code section 9.10.010. For the purposes of charging monetary penalties, each day's discharge and each component (flow, BOD, and TSS) shall be considered a separate event. Monetary penalties shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, the following:
 - All costs associated with providing treatment to the industrial slug discharge.

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- b. All costs associated with repair of equipment damaged by, or associated with, providing treatment to the industrial slug discharge.
- c. All costs associated with NPDES permit violations, federal or state government orders resulting from NPDES permit violations, penalties imposed by the federal or state government upon the City for NPDES permit violations, and all costs associated with any citizens lawsuit filed against the City for NPDES permit violations.
- d. Industrial slug discharges lasting five (5) or more consecutive days shall be subject to the surcharge provisions of Section 4.A.(3) of this Resolution whether or not the industrial user's maximum monthly allocated capacity is exceeded.
- (8) Outside utility industrial users shall pay one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the applicable sewer service rates charged to City industrial users.

B. Industrial Users Not Required to Have Monitoring Stations

(1) Industrial users not required to have metering and monitoring stations shall be charged at Commercial/Business Rates as described in Section 2. The Public Works Director shall determine which category of Commercial/Business rates shall apply to the industrial user.

C. Industrial Users Required to Have Monitoring Stations

- (1) The minimum monthly charge to an industrial account in this category shall be six-hundred sixty-nine dollars and ninety-six cents (\$669.96) per month, per industry.
- (2) Industrial users required to install City-approved monitoring stations on their discharges to the City, but not required to connect to the City pretreatment facility, shall be charged for sewer service based upon the volume, strength, and characteristics of the wastewater as determined by the monitoring station results at the following rates:

D. Industrial Users Required to Connect to the City Pretreatment Facility

(1) The minimum monthly charge to an industrial account in this category shall be one thousand one hundred sixteen dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$1,116.67) per month, per monitoring station, per industry.

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(2) The industrial pretreatment facility is recognized as having a finite capacity to treat wastewater. The following capacities and limitations have been established:

Component	<u>Units</u>	Capacity	Occurrence

BOD	lbs/day	4,000	Max. Monthly BOD Loading

- (3) In the event of multiple users of the pretreatment facility, the City shall allocate a respective share of the capacity of each component to each of the users.
- (4) Industrial users required to connect to the City pretreatment facility shall install City-approved monitoring stations at their expense on their wastewater discharge lines to monitor the volume, strength, and characteristics of their wastewater discharges into the pretreatment facility. Charges for sewer service shall be based upon the volume, strength, and characteristics of the wastewater discharged to the pretreatment facility as determined by monitoring station results at the following rates:

Component	Symbol	Rate
Hydraulic (flow)	Q	\$1.1418 per 100 cu.ft.
Biochemical oxygen demand	BOD	\$0.5010 per pound
Total suspended solids	TSS	\$0.8810 per pound

(5) The pH of discharges from all industrial users discharging liquids into the industrial pretreatment system shall not be lower than 5.0 nor greater than 11.0 as determined by monitoring station results. Any discharge of waste outside this range shall be subject to a penalty of two hundred fifty-seven dollars and thirty-six cents (\$257.36) per day. For the purposes of this monetary penalty, each day's discharge shall be considered a separate event.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the rates set forth herein shall be effective commencing on January 1, 2024.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SELAH, WASHINGTON, as follows:

- b) The minimum charge per month for the availability of water service for two-family dwellings, multiple dwellings, group houses and condominiums, apartment houses, and mobile home parks as defined in Chapter 10.02 shall be fourteen dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$14.78) for each dwelling unit or mobile home space. Each dwelling unit or mobile home space shall be allotted 300 cubic feet of minimum consumption, and water used over this minimum amount shall be charged at the applicable rate in section (a) above.
- c) Low-Income Senior Citizens and Low-Income Disabled Persons Occupant Rate.
 - (1) Single-family dwellings shall be charged thirteen dollars and two cents (\$13.02) per month, for the first 300 cubic feet of water consumption. Additional water consumption will be charged at the rate of one dollar and sixty-one cents (\$1.61) per 100 cubic feet for the next 700 cubic feet and one dollar and twenty-eight cents (\$1.28) per 100 cubic feet for over 1,000 cubic feet.
 - (2) A senior citizen is a person who occupies a dwelling unit and is sixty-two years of age or older.
 - (3) A low-income senior citizen shall be a senior citizen whose income, combined with the income of other household occupants, if any, for the calendar year preceding was less than:

- (5) A low-income disabled person shall be a disabled person whose income, combined with other household occupants, if any, for the calendar year preceding was less than:

- (7) Determination of eligibility shall be made by the City Clerk-Treasurer based upon the annual statement of the low-income senior citizen or low-income disabled person, or any other reasonable and verifiable means at the discretion of the Clerk-Treasurer.

- d) Outside utility users shall pay one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the applicable water service charges charged to City residents and commercial/business users.
- e) Bulk water consumers shall be served at the convenience of the City and shall pay the sum of ten dollars and fifty cents (\$10.50) per fill and two dollars and thirty cents (\$2.30) per hundred gallon unit.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the rates set forth herein shall be effective commencing January 1, 2024.

ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 10.34.120 OF THE SELAH MUNICIPAL CODE, REGARDING A DOWNTOWN PARKING EXEMPT AREA; ADOPTING A NEW SECTION 10.34.125 OF THE SELAH MUNICIPAL CODE, REGARDING ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AUTHORIZING CORRECTIONS; DIRECTING TRANSMITTAL TO THE STATE; AND DIRECTING PUBLICATION AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, Selah is required, pursuant to RCW 36.70A.040, to plan in accordance with the Growth Management Act; and

WHEREAS, Selah is further required, pursuant to RCW 36.70A.130(1), to take legislative action to review and revise its development regulations in accordance with the Growth Management Act; and

WHEREAS, RCW 36.70A.020 set forth planning goals to guide the development and adoption of comprehensive plans and development regulations; and

WHEREAS, Selah Municipal Code (SMC) Title 10 contains zoning and subdivision regulations that govern the Selah's administrative procedures for development actions; and

WHEREAS, Selah last amended its parking regulations in 2004; and

WHEREAS, Selah's Planning Commission conducted a study session on October 24, 2023, relative to draft Parking Exempt and EV Charging Station amendments for the SMC; and

WHEREAS, on October 27, 2023, public notice of the Planning Commission's next forthcoming public hearing to be held on November 21, 2023, was published in the official newspaper of the City and also sent to all parties who expressed interest in the development regulations through the public review and SEPA processes; and

WHEREAS, an environmental review was conducted under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) and a Determination of Nonsignificance (DNS) was issued on November 10, 2023; and

WHEREAS, at its public hearing on November 21, 2023, the Planning Commission heard a presentation from City staff regarding the proposed code amendments, allowed time for public testimony, and ultimately recommended that the proposed amendments by approved by the City Council via later action; and

WHEREAS, on November 19, 2023, public notice of the City Council's next forthcoming public hearing to be held on December 12, 2023, was published in the official newspaper of the City and also sent to all parties who expressed interest in being notified and who commented on the draft amendments through the public review and SEPA processes or at the Planning Commission's prior public hearing; and

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WHEREAS, all persons desiring to either provide written testimony or speak regarding the proposed code amendments – during the Planning Commission's public hearing on November 21, 2023, and/or during the City Council's public meeting on December 12, 2023 – were given a fair opportunity to be provide testimony and speak; and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems itself sufficient apprised in this matter and finds that good cause exists to adopt the proposed code amendments;


NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SELAH, WASHINGTON, does hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. Adoption of Planning Commission's Recommendation; Findings and Conclusions based on Record. That, following review of the entire record of testimony and exhibits, including the Planning Commission's recommendation and any written and oral testimony presented directly to the City Council on or in advance of December 12, 2023, the Planning Commission's recommendation is adopted. Further, that the City Council's findings and conclusions are based on such record.

Section 2. Amendment of SMC Section 10.34.120. That the titles, substantive bodies and internally-referenced preexisting "Figure 34-1", "Table 34-A" and "Table 34-1" of and within SMC section 10.34.120 be and are retitled and amended as shown in the following editing marks (which are included in this Ordinance for ease of reference, but which shall be removed when the codifier publishes the official updated version of SMC 10.34.120 on the internet; and with the new "Figure A" fully replacing its unlabeled predecessor, which predecessor is not set forth on the face of this Ordinance):

10.34.120 Exemption Downtown Parking Exempt Area.

A portion of the eentral business core, city's downtown Business, General (B-2) zoning district, the shaded area in Figure 34-1_depicted in Figure A set forth below, is exempt from the provisions of this chapter relative to the number of off-street parking spaces required. All other requirements of this chapter shall apply to any off-street parking provided by a property owner or business.

Section 3. Adoption of New SMC section 10.34.125. That a SMC section 10.34.125 be and is adopted, so as to have a title and substantive body set forth below:

10.34.125 Electric Vehicle Charging Stations.

Electric vehicle charging stations – as defined by RCW 36.70A.695(5) in its now-existing form and, also, each and every future form of the statute following any amendment, addition or recodification that the state government enacts or effectuates – shall not be allowed on resource lands or in critical areas, but shall be allowed as set forth in subsections (a) and (b) below:

- (a) As an accessory use to an approved principal use that is situated in the B-1, B-2 or M-1 zoning district.
- (b) Pursuant to an issued right-of-way use permit with regard to a public parking lot or on-street public parking area.

Section 4. Severability. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, be declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid for any reason, or should any portion of this Ordinance be preempted by state or federal law or regulation, such decision or preemption shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or its application to other persons or circumstances.

Section 3. Corrections. The City Attorney and the codifiers of the Selah Municipal Code are authorized to make any necessary or desirable clerical or formatting changes – including but not limited to correcting scrivener errors; changing formatting; eliminating bold, italic and underscore emphasis; changing numbering; and correcting references – when publishing or republishing the official text of any section(s) of the Selah Municipal Code due to any amendment, addition, alteration, change, impact or enactment effectuated by this Ordinance.

Section 4. Transmittal to State. A copy of this Ordinance shall be submitted to the Washington State Department of Commerce for inclusion within its records, both within 10 days following adoption of the Ordinance and also within 10 days following any correction(s) that might be applied by the City Attorney or codifiers pursuant to Section 3 above.

Section 5. Publishing & Effective Date. Consistent with RCW 35A.12.130 (3^{rd} ¶) and .160 (1^{st} and 2^{nd} ¶¶), this Ordinance or a summary of it shall be published at least once in the City's official newspaper prior to the Ordinance taking effect.

Background/Findings/Facts: At the conclusion of each calendar year, the City Council needs to establish – by adopting an Ordinance – the salary and wage base rates that will apply for the City's unrepresented (a/k/a non-union) positions during the following calendar year. The base rates for 2024 are the subject of this AIS and the corresponding proposed four-page Ordinance.

For reference, I have appended a copy of the ordinance for the current year of 2023 – specifically, Ordinance No. 2185.

Monetarily, City management is proposing a five percent (5.00%) cost of living (COLA) adjustment for nearly all of these positions. Such five-percent COLA figure was previously discussed with the Finance Committee. One exception is the position of Planning & Building Permit Specialist at the Public Works Department, for which City management is proposing a nearly ten percent (10.00%) overall adjustment, comprised of both the above-mentioned five-percent COLA and also a general raise.

The salary/wage ranges (i.e., the difference between each minimum amount and maximum amount) will also change in comparison to 2023. For 2023, the ranges were about ten percent (10.00%) for all positions. During 2024, many of the ranges will be enlarged to fifteen percent (15.00%) and some will be reduced to just four percent (4.00%).

The listed order of positions has also been modified. Specifically, the Community Service positions (who work out of the Civic Center) have been moved downward on the list (such that they appear on page 2 of the now-under-consideration proposed Ordinance, versus having appeared on page 1 of the Ordinance No. 2185 for 2023) and those positions are now expressly recited as being part of the Public Works Department (because the Public Works Director will be the supervising department head for those positions).

The state-wide minimum wage during 2024 will be \$16.28 per hour. As allowed by state law, any referee or scorekeeper who is 14 or 15 years of age may be employed at an hourly rate that is 85% of the then-applicable minimum wage, which will equate to \$13.84 per hour during the calendar year of 2024.

<u>Section 2</u>. <u>Clarifications and Cross-References</u>. The following clarifications and cross-references apply:

- a. Not every position recited above is presently occupied as of the date of this Ordinance and the City is not required to fill every position. As allowed by SMC 1.10.031(e), some positions recited above are nonexclusive positions, which means that multiple people may occupy those positions at the same time.
- b. As allowed by SMC 1.10.031(a) & (c), additional or different positions may be created at the discretion of the Mayor, and multiple positions may be combined at the discretion of the Mayor so long as the salary/wage rate paid to any person occupying a combined position does not exceed the maximum amount specified on this Ordinance for the highest-paid of the combined positions or a new amount specifically approved by the City Council. As of the date of this Ordinance, the three positions of Human Resources Manager, Public Records Manager and [City Hall] Administrative Assistant are combined and are occupied by a single person, and such person will be paid a salary that does not exceed the maximum amount specified on this Ordinance for such combined position.
- c. This Ordinance establishes a salary/wage range for each position. Whenever the City advertises an opening as to any position recited above, the full salary/wage range should be specified within the advertisement(s). Any new person hired into a fulltime position recited above should ordinarily begin at, or near, the minimum rate amount specified for that position. Thereafter, one or more periodic salary/wage increase(s) should occur when appropriate prior to the person then earning the maximum salary/wage for the fulltime position. When a person is promoted from a fulltime position to a higher fulltime position, the person may immediately be paid the maximum rate specified for the higher fulltime

position at the discretion of the Mayor.

- d. This Ordinance only establishes base salary rates and base wage rates. By contrast, it does not establish, guarantee or restrict any fringe benefits (such as insurance coverage, vacation and leave accruals, and retirement accruals), any longevity pay accruals or any overtime or comp time accruals that might exist or apply.
- e. As reflected by its title and body, this Ordinance only pertains to unrepresented (a/k/a non-union) positions. Represented employees (a/k/a union members) will be paid the salaries/wages specified by the then-applicable Collective Bargaining Agreement (or other union contract) that governs their employment. As of the date of this Ordinance, most Police Department employees and many Public Works Department employees are represented employees (a/k/a union members).
- f. Ordinance No. 2185 was the applicable salary and wage ordinance for the year of 2023.

Section 3. Publishing and Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force as of January 1, 2024. A summary of this Ordinance shall be published in the City's official newspaper, consistent with RCW 35A.12.120 and .160, at least five calendar days prior to January 1, 2023.
